

The idea for Monty Python's Flying Circus was first talked over in a conference room in the BBC Television Centre in June of last year. Round the table sat John Cleese, Grahame Chapman, Terry Jones, Eric Idle, Michael Palin, myself, John Howard Davies, who directed the first four episodes for Monty Python, and Barry Took, who had brought the five together under the BBC's banner.

Barry Took introduced us then left. We then started to thrash out a format, if you could call it that, for the series. Very quickly I realised that the writers' humour was my humour, and knew we would have fun doing the show. The only difficulty was - a title. We chose Monty Python's Flying Circus for three carefully considered reasons:-

- because as far as we knew, there was no-one called Monty Python;
- because it had nothing to do with flying;
- because it was not a circus.

We admit quite happily that this title has caused a certain amount of fun and confusion. Plain silly to quote the Colonel. More messing about.

I believe that Monty Python's Flying Circus has something to amuse anyone with a sense of humour which includes, I hope, all of us.

BBC's 'SILLY' FLYING CIRCUS

"LONDON - By definition, judgment is a subjective operation, and never so much as when about humour. So, what follows is purely one man's opinion.

There is a television series of the British Broadcasting Corporation that is the funniest set of 13 half-hour programmes ever produced.

Some have tried to find the key or to name the genre, and end up with phrases like "manic flow". The people who write and perform it simply call it "silly". That it is, but silly with the exquisiteness of Belgian lace. The show is called "Monty Python's Flying Circus". It is not a circus nor is it flying. There is no Monty Python..... written, produced and acted by six men and one girl, all under 30, mostly Oxbridge, and all attractive. Its weekly budget is ludicrously small, even by British standards, not to mention American. Six make-up men convert that many actors into four times as many characters for each show - and fast.

BBC began the programme with trepidation..... worries that it will appeal only to a small fraction of the viewers. Maybe so, but that's what American editors thought when the comic strip "Peanuts" first came on the market.

I think, on the contrary, that it's everyone's dish except those at the far ends of the spectrum, the primitive snobs and the desiccated ones. Where "Laugh In" covers its feeble jokes with numbers and speed, and is vulgarly vulgar, "Circus" has no truck with the quick one-liners, the blackouts and the boffos, and is elegantly vulgar.

If some American television agent doesn't snap up Monty Python & Co., he is stupid crazy. Monty Python & Co. are brilliantly crazy.
